Tree Planting Drive



Tree planting is an important element in the solution to tackle climate change - Trees absorb carbon dioxide and are vital carbon sinks. Planting trees helps reduce the risk of catastrophic climate change. Planting trees helps to counteract the effects of deforestation, which stabilizes the local climate and soil. It also provides an important habitat for wildlife, birds and contributes to biodiversity. Tree planting activities is a simple but ingenious method to heal the planet. Planting trees is a great way to make community aware that their actions have a big impact on the environment. About 400 community volunteers were participated in our tree

planting campaign during the month of July 2011. To make this programme a success, we have made sure that these saplings and small trees being planted in waste land are nurtured for a long time. Together we have been planted some important local species like (gooseberry, neem, eucalyptus, etc) and fruit trees like (mango, blackberry, tamarind, jack fruit, guava etc). All together we have planted more than 8,000 trees in different locations. While there is no one solution to the world's ecological and climate change problems, it is a time tested fact that

the simplest and the most effective solution are to just plant trees.

Mangrove Forest Restoration

Yes Mangroves, No Shrimp Ponds!

The single greatest threat to mangroves worldwide is shrimp farming. During the last decade's large numbers of shrimp ponds has come up around Bhitarkanika Mangrove forests, the second largest mangrove forest in Asia. The ponds are treated with antibiotics, pesticides, often dumped into the surrounding land or waterways. This has badly affected the fragile ecosystem and its environment. The destruction of mangrove forests means ecosystems are knocked out of balance.

Wetlands to Wastelands.....

In the year 1995, 1350 ha (4036 acres) land of mangrove forests were wipe out to established shrimp ponds, a World Bank aided project by the Fishery Department, Govt of Orissa at Mahakalpara block of Kendrapara district. Destruction of these mangroves has left local communities vulnerable to the devastating impacts of cyclones and has reportedly had socio-economic impacts of the local community. The project was failed and 1350 ha area of shrimp ponds are still abandoned. Mangroves have traditionally been used for shrimp farming, but with the expansion of commercial shrimp farming and the associated clearance of mangroves, these valuable ecosystems have been rapidly degraded.



Working with communities.....

Putting the message to mangrove communities, schoolchildren, and public representatives turned out to be a pleasant experience for APOWA Team. Finally, an oath was administered to all participants to protect the magroves and minimize the impact of deforestation. Mangrove plantation has been conducted at Kundapur Matidanda nala in association with local youth club members.

Rescue of Baby Olive Ridley Sea Turtles



In the month of June, APOWA has been completed its responsibilities and commitment on another successful season of 'sea turtle and their habitat conservation programme' along Orissa coast. Our rescue team members and volunteers were rescued disoriented baby Olive Ridley sea turtles and released them safely into the Sea along major nesting sites in Orissa.

They have a long journey ahead of them; some will not survive the treacherous journey, others will travel thousands of ocean miles to return as adults to birth places.
